Have salt in yourselves, and be at peace with one another.

Mark 9:50

Tuesday, September 21, 1981 was International Day of Peace. I really was not aware of the observance of a day of peace until I was asked to lead a prayer during Norwich City ceremony calling for peace here in Norwich and all around the world. The day of peace was established in 1981 by unanimous United Nations resolution. It is a call to every human to commit to peace above all differences and to contribute to building a Culture of Peace.

As I learned about the UN's commitment to peace and looked at the art given to helping people around the world work for peace there were many symbols I recognized like our peace pole in our courtyard and the origami crane folding that my grandchildren do each year during Advent to pray for peace.

In the proclamation given by Mayor, Peter Albert Nystrom one of the Whereas says, "life is better in a world where peace exists and we look to those who have been peacemakers and peacekeepers to learn what we can each do individually to make the world a more peaceful place."

Mark 9:50 "Have salt in yourselves, and be at peace with one another." Perhaps the salt in ourselves is the many reminders we as humans need to be at peace. Peace first within ourselves and then it is possible with God's spirit to have peace with others.

Vicar Eric's Thoughts

Hello Friends in Christ,

In case you are unaware I have recently begun making a series of videos called "Vicar Out and About". I post these videos on Facebook as well as Tik Tok. In one of these videos, I discussed the importance of rest and how in scripture we find multiple instances of God talking about the need for us to have rest. I don't know if our lives are busier than during the times of Jesus but if you are like me the calendar and the days fill up quickly with work and other activities.

Although rest is important, we need to make sure that we don't interpret the scripture lessons about rest as a reason to step away from church or our church family. On my commute to and from Norwich from Manchester I recently noticed a sign in front of a church stating they are having a "Back to Church Sunday" coming up. I am a bit confused by that. While I know summer vacations and travel plans sometimes prevent us from attending church services and activities, the church does not go away or close. The church calendar is not like a school calendar.

In my young adult days when I often stayed out late on Saturday nights I would sleep in on Sunday. I chose not to go to worship and instead stayed home drinking coffee and reading the paper. After a while that became my routine and I stopped attending worship. When I made the conscious effort to return to church, I realized the void I had created in my life. I found myself back in a stronger relationship with God. The Gospel of Matthew 18:20 states, "For where two or three are gath-

ered in my name, I am there among them."

God is with you when you are not in church too, but this verse acknowledges the special joy God finds in us gathering in church. Remember too that our community at St. Mark is a family in Christ. When you come to church you bring your unique self to our family. You are an important family member and are missed when you are not present. When you do not come to church it is like having a family dinner and having an empty place at the table.

St. Mark has a full schedule each week. The schedule provides opportunity for worship, study, and fellowship. Even if you can't make it to worship you can come for study or fellowship events. A new opportunity for fellowship and exercise suggested by one of our members recently started. It is a walk around the neighborhood of the church. This walk happens on Thursdays at 9am.

You are a loved member of the St. Mark family. You and your friends are welcome regularly at all events.

Cathedrals - Visual Essence of Faith Seminar - New Time

Beginning on October 9th the seminar will begin at 10:00 a.m.

To step inside a Gothic cathedral is to step inside the visual essence of the Christian faith. Since the Christianization of Europe in the 4th century, cathedrals have served as centers of ecclesiastical authority; marvels of architectural genius and innovation; places to instruct

communities about cherished Christian values and lessons, and sites of political, cultural, intellectual, and economic importance. Bring these captivating buildings right into your own home in this course, taught by noted medieval historian and award-winning Professor William R. Cook of SUNY Geneseo. These 24 lavishly illustrated lectures make use of high-definition 3-D modeling and imagery to not just show you the world's great Gothic cathedrals, but to take you around and inside them. The seminar will begin at 4:30 p.m. on Saturday, October 2, in Memorial Hall and start at 10:00 a.m. on October 9th.



Blessing of the Animals

St. Francis of Assisi is remembered on October 4. He is known for his love of nature. He was the son of a wealthy merchant. In a public confrontation with his father, he renounced his wealth and future inheritance and devoted himself to serving the poor. Francis described this act as being "wedded to Lady Poverty." Under his leadership the Order of Friars Minor (Franciscans) was formed, and they took literally Jesus' words to his disciples that they should take nothing on their journey and receive no payment for their work. Their task in preaching was to "use words if necessary." Francis had a spirit of gladness and gratitude for all of God's creation. This commemoration has been a traditional time to bless pets and animals, creatures Francis called his brothers and sisters.

Keeping this tradition we invite you to bring your pets to worship on October 3 and within our worship there will be an opportunity to bring them for a blessing during our 9:30 a.m. outdoor service. All pets are invited: dogs, cats, rabbits, etc.




Taking Part in Worship

There are many opportunities for individuals to get involved in worship at St. Mark. Each Sunday, we need volunteers to be assisting ministers, readers, kyrie singers, ushers, altar guild members, cameramen, and audio techs. These roles are vital to our worship, and it is easy to join the volunteer schedule and learn how to do them. If you are interested in helping with any of these roles, please call the office or speak with Linda Mandel. Pastor Mary, along with our audio-visual personnel, are happy to train new volunteers.

Bible Study

Bible study is offered on Fridays at 10:00 am. Pastor Mary guides the members in reading and interpreting the texts from the Bible which will be read at the Saturday and Sunday worship that week. Come at 10:00 or remain following Morning Prayer. We meet outside. Coffee will be ready for you to pour yourself a cup. The conversation includes a reading from the Bible and our understanding of just what was intended for our sense of purpose. Come once or come often. The Community Luncheon Grab and Go is being held at St. Mark. People enter through the handicap door on the side of the building. Tables are set up with food for them to take, and they go out through the Memorial Hall Door to the parking lot.

The Community Luncheon, supported by the Norwich Area Clergy Association, provides a take-out lunch each Sunday. There is a free breakfast and lunch, Monday through Saturday given by St. Vincent de Paul, but Sunday had no opportunity for those in need to have food. Many years ago the NACA began the practice of giving the meal on Sunday to those who live on the streets and those who have no other means of securing food. St. Mark has been involved with this important ministry from the beginning so many years ago. St. Mark has joined with other congregations here in Norwich in providing for the needy.
